

Refunds Being Sent To 4,062 Left Out Of Woodstock Fair

Some ticket holders who were unable to gain admittance to the Woodstock Music Festival when several hundred thousand persons converged last August on the town of Bethel, N.Y., will be receiving checks soon from the state Attorney General's office.

Attorney General Louis J. Lefkowitz said yesterday that his office had begun to mail checks to 4,062 claimants who had filed affidavits involving \$100,000 worth of tickets.

"Approximately 25 per cent of the face amount of the tickets will be reimbursed to all verified claimants within the next few weeks, as soon as clerically feasible," Mr. Lefkowitz said.

The \$25,000 in reimbursement funds was provided at the urging of the Attorney General's office by John Roberts, the president of Woodstock Ventures, Inc., which sponsored the three-day rock music festival.

Mr. Lefkowitz said that he had initiated an inquiry after receiving hundreds of complaints about conditions that prevented ticket holders from attending the festival.

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
